Myself, committee and members will meet the challenges of the next few months. We look forward to meeting our U3A friends in more familiar circumstances and returning to the vibrant U3A we are.


This year our A.G.M. will be on Zoom. As per our Constitution we need a quorum of at least 100 members. Please join us on 18 January to make this possible.



Many of you will recall that our Group Leader John Mangold has wanted to step back from the managing committee, and that has now taken place although he is going to continue as both a member and as someone willing to help steer us in the right direction. For some time we have been seeking a co-ordinator for the steering committee and I can now say we are delighted that one of us has now come forward to take on the post. We are therefore exceedingly grateful to both John, and to our new leader Viki Worthington to whom we also offer support for a successful period in charge.

Security, your Android Phone and why it's important

Like many people today I have a number of financial apps on my phone. I have two for internet banking, Google Pay for contactless payments with my phone and PayPal. In the current climate cash is becoming less welcome, so I also have a number of parking applications so I don't have to rummage around for small change when parking. Then there's the ever popular Amazon for online shopping.

So you **really** need to trust that your phone is secure and it identifies your phone and the banking and other apps I use need to know that it's really me and I'm using my own phone. You can see from this overview that security is a chain and each link has to be strong

At the start of the chain, modern smartphones have a cryptographic security chip built in. Google uses its own Titan M chip, if you have an iPhone it uses something called Secure Enclave, other phones use ARM's TrustZone. All these provide means of making sure that your Android operating system hasn't been compromised in any way and also provide a unique secure identity for any app that needs it.

The chips also store your phone login credentials, fingerprint, pin code, password or face recognition. The data on your phone is encrypted and the decryption key is stored in the security chip.

Compare this to yester year when a cheque could be endorsed to a third party, your signature was there for all to see along with your sort code and account number!

Of course if you only use your phone for texts and phone calls, you might not need all the security but in the world of cyber crime for me it's very important.

Women Achievers

'Anything you can do I can do better....' (song from the musical 'Annie Get your Gun')
Having journeyed from Biblical times to the 19thC, studying the outstanding achievements of so many women, we have been temporarily halted in the sidings by the Covid 19 virus. So while we wait to progress further, here is a list of just some of the women in my lifetime, who have outperformed everyone in this country and, in many cases, in the world.

Helen Sharman CMG, OBE, Hon FRSC, Chemist, The first British astronaut and first woman in the world to visit the MIR space station.

Dame Ellen McCarthur DBE and Knight (Chevalier) of French legion of Honour. In 2005 broke the world record for the fastest solo circumnavigation of the world. She has broken other records, but retired in 2010 to work for the charity foundation in her name.

Rosalind Franklin. Best known for her contribution to the discovery of the molecular structure of DNA. Later led pioneering work on the molecular structure of viruses. After her death one of her team carried on her work and received the Nobel prize for Chemistry.

Dame Evelyn Glennie. World's first solo multi-percussionist. Deaf since aged 12, she feels the music through her

body, playing in bare feet. She has made forty solo CDs.

Jaqueline Du Pre. Born 1945. Acknowledged as the greatest cellist of all time. Made her formal debut in 1961 at the Wigmore Hall and a year later performed Elgar's Cello concerto at the Proms, with Sir Malcolm Sargeant

conducting. She owned two Stradivarius cellos, one made in 1673 the other in 1712.

Baroness Jennie Lee a Scottish Labour MP who won her seat in a by-election aged 25, at a time when only women over 30 could vote, and was youngest ever female MP. As Minister of Arts she created the Open University, where envolved the open to all, with no educational qualification or entrance exam required. The OU is the UK's largest academic organisation and a world pioneer in distance learning. It has taught over 2 million students worldwide.

Elizabeth David 1913 – 1992. Universally hailed as Britain's foremost writer on food and cooking. Having spent years abroad in France, Italy and Greece, she was appalled at the dire standard of food served in 1950s England. Her first book *Mediterranean cooking* was a great success and together with later books, success the standard of the standard introduced a whole new range of ingredients to British cooking, such as pasta, olive oil, saffron, aubergines, parmesan cheese, peppers etc.

Virginia Woolf. 1882 to 1941. The most important modernist writer of 20thC. She pioneered the use of stream

of consciousness, used later by James Joyce and Marcel Proust. Her books include *To the Lighthouse* Orlando and Mrs Dalloway.

Lilian Baylis. Theatrical producer and manager. She revived the failing Old Vic, producing many works by Shakespeare and this eventually became the forerunner of the National Theatre. Sadler's Wells theatre was derelict at this time and she led a successful campaign to re-open it, eventually becoming the base for the Royal Ballet and Birmingham Royal ballet.

Dame Elizabeth Anionwu. Nurse, Sickle cell and Thalasseamia specialist, Healthcare Administrator and Educator. Emeritus professor of Nursing, University of West London. Some of you may remember her inspiring talk to us at a General Meeting several years ago.



2021.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I would like to take this opportunity to report back on the last twelve months of Orpington U3A. It is hard to think back to pre-March with an excess of 200 attending our Monday general meeting, BR6 and The Buff attracting 30+ and the advent of new groups, Bridge for Beginners, Gardening Made Easy being just a few.

With the advent of the virus, all our lives changed. I am pleased to say that in part, Orpington met that challenge with groups meeting outside, Zoom meetings and Group leaders keeping in touch. Sadly with some groups it was physically impossible to carry on as before.

We, the Committee, aware of the strain of the above have decided to keep the membership fee at £10 for existing members for 2021, and £12 for new members. The subscription of £10 has been at this level since 2014, one of the lowest in the country.

Though our accounts show a healthy reserve we are subject to third party increases beyond our control, we have an increase to £4 for each member to the Trust, payment for Beacon our online management tool and inflationary trends across the board, sadly our membership numbers, as with other U3As are under pressure and we face static costs with reduced membership income.

You will find a further explanation on expenditure and income attached to the Treasurer's Report.

This year our A G.M, as previously mentioned, will be on Zoom, as per our Constitution we need a quorum of at least 100 members, please join us on the 9th January to make this possible.

GROUP COORDINATORS REPORT

Seeking inspiration as to what to write at the end of such a difficult year, I reread my last year's report. It is hard to remember back to those initiatives we had begun – Committee members visiting groups and Chairman's Teas for Group Leaders - and to the excitement we had felt about new groups that had started. However, what struck me the most was how little had really changed. Our groups are still there, led by our indefatigable Group Leaders who give their

time, energy and commitment to ensuring that our organisation continues.

With this in mind, the Committee decided to conduct a survey of Group Leaders as a 'where are we now?' exercise, to help us understand the factors affecting the future of our U3A, including how to assess next year's potential membership and costs. The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with those groups who have been able to carry on in some form continuing to do so whilst adhering to the regulations sent out by National Office. Some groups have met for walks under the 'rule of six'; many groups are meeting via zoom; members of groups have been phoning each other or exchanging emails; one Group Leader has made a newsletter of jokes, recipes etc.; another is making short videos of photos sent in; one of the book groups is rotating a sack of books from which to choose and add to; a few groups are holding quizzes or competitions; and several have managed to meet in their gardens whilst the weather was good. Of course, we realise that these options are not suitable for all groups, but we are pleased that so much

communication between our members is taking place in a time when it is easy to feel forgotten.

During our monthly Committee meetings, held via Zoom, we are constantly discussing the future and what will happen when we get back to the way things used to be. TREASURER'S REPORT

A copy of the Summary of Accounts for the period 1/12/2019 to 12/11/2020 is available on the website or from the Treasurer. The early closure was to allow the report to be published in the December Newsletter.

The unusual circumstances of 2020 have resulted in our bank account showing a surplus of £1233, leading to a total reserve a few pounds short of £14000. Savings on hall hire and speakers accounted for most of this surplus whilst there were also significant reductions in administration costs, catering and National Conference expenses. These savings are expected to continue into 2021, however the major expenses, (Third Age Trust subscriptions, TAM Mail, Beacon, News printing and post), will remain and are expected to increase. In particular, the Trust subscriptions are based on the previous year's membership which in 2021 will be a cost of at least £3450.

Credit card subscription payment via Beacon and Paypal has proved very successful this year with 235 transactions completed. This has greatly reduced the number of visits to the bank to deposit cash and cheques.

As stated in previous reports, areas for potential cost savings remain as follows:

Gift Aid; The Gift Aid claim accounts for around 12% of our income.

Email; Opting to receive the newsletter by email will help to limit costs and it also arrives faster.

Third Age Matters. If you never read the magazine mailed by the Third Age Trust and it just ends up in the recycling bin, let one of the Committee members know and we can then remove your address from the Trust's

After three years of deficits, and with 2020 originally expected to follow suit, it had been planned to increase the membership subscription to £12 for 2021 in order to cover for possible reductions in membership numbers. However, the Covid turn around in our finances means that we are able to maintain the subscription level at £10 until February 28/2/2022 for current members. The subscription for new members joining after the 1/12/2021 will be £12.

Finally, I would like to thank Ken Cridland, who kindly volunteered to examine the accounts.
