Philosophy

This is a summary of John Mangold's power-point presentation to the Philosophy group in September which provoked a lot of discussion. The group will continue the discussion at its next meeting on Friday 1st October at 10.00am. New members are welcome.

WOKE

The word Woke has achieved widespread use in recent years, but many are confused about its meaning and its origins. In some varieties of African-American English, woke is used in place of woken, and this has led to its use as an adjective in the U.S.A.

The black American folk singer Lead Belly, uses the phrase in his 1938 song Scottsboro Boys, about nine black teenagers accused of rape, saying they should 'be a little careful, best stay woke, keep their eyes open'

After its adoption by the Black Lives Matter movement, it became more politicised and attracted other groups speaking out for oppressed minorities. Rather than being applied solely to racial issues, it was increasingly used as a catch-all term to describe several left-wing ideologies.

Woke has become the subject of right-wing ironic usage and criticism, and in many cases downright abuse, and is used to denigrate those campaigning against racism, sexism and other forms of discrimination.

At its simplest it means a general awareness of discrimination and oppression, whether due to racism, homophobia or any other prejudice. However, due to its origins, and the increasing divide between the left and the right, it has become the focus of a battleground of ideologies.

Science and Technology

At last in August we were able to get together for our first 'live' meeting since 2020! We began with two short talks followed by a 'Science News' section, all presented by members of the group. A wide variety of topics was covered, so there was something to interest everyone.

John Mangold gave us an interesting insight into the world of 'Tracker Dogs' and what characteristics make them so well adapted for following scents. Did you know that humans have up to 5 million olfactory recentors but dogs.

Did you know that humans have up to 5 million olfactory receptors but dogs may have as many as 300 million? The olfactory area of the canine brain is also highly developed. John went on to explain how dogs are also able to follow a scent trail using environmental clues.

Viki Worthington then presented 'A Clinical Case' starting with the initial symptoms and first consultation at the GP surgery. The step by step process of investigations and tests leading to the final diagnosis was discussed. The aim of the talk was to illustrate what the process of clinical diagnosis may involve and how the specialist healthcare professionals work together.

At both the August and September meetings Anthony Bradburne presented short COVID-19 updates, giving us a summary of the current vaccines, variants, latest figures and theories

In September following his previous presentation 'Quantum Computing', John Stephenson gave a thorough and interesting talk on 'Quantum Communications' with particular emphasis on encryption of information and the power of quantum computers to decode messages. He also explained how information channels can be protected using digital and quantum keys. Although a 'Quantum Internet' is still a dream, a Chinese quantum communications satellite 'Micius' was launched in 2016. It is designed to facilitate space-to-ground communication and to aid development of quantum encryption and quantum teleportation technology.

The London Region Summer School 2021

In August I attended the U3A one-day Summer School at the St Bride's Foundation just off Fleet Street. Usually these Summer Schools last for three days, but this year it was decided to limit it to one. There were talks, walks and live music during the day, with coffee and a very up-market packed lunch!

I attended two talks. The first was entitled 'London's Forgotten Disasters'. Matt Brown is a writer and researcher who has written 11 books about London, and this talk aimed to inform and surprise with strange and obscure of hour the service. with strange and obscure stories of how the capital has accidentally seen off large numbers of its inhabitants. Did you know, for example, that the Fire of London we all remember in 1666 was in fact, London's second major fire? The first was in 1212, when far more people were killed than in 1666. The fire started in Southwark, and spread to London Bridge, which was covered in wooden shops and houses; people ran from the North Bank to help those on the bridge, and the bridge collapsed killing. on the bridge, and the bridge collapsed, killing hundreds, if not thousands. Have you heard of the Great Beer Flood of 1814, when 2.5 million pints of porter flooded what is now the site of the Dominion Theatre in Tottenham Court Road, and 7 people were drowned in their homes? What about the 40 ice skaters who drowned in Regents Park when the ice cracked, leading to all ponds and lakes in London being filled with silt, to make them shallower? Eleven forgotten disasters in all, none of which has any kind of memorial to those who died. It sounds morbid, but Matt was entertaining and immensely knowledgeable.


The second talk I attended was about the addition of sound to silent pictures in the late 1920s. Again, the speaker, David Evans, was extremely knowledgeable and articulate, making what could have been a complicated and difficult to understand entertaining and memorable.

There was also a choice of walks. I decided to do the Victoria Embankment walk, looking at the history and characters of the Embankment and the Embankment Gardens. I knew a little about the building of the Embankment, but I learned a lot from the walk, seeing memorials that I must have passed dozens of times, and not really 'seen', and learning the history of the many statues in the Gardens (of which only one out of 12 is of a woman).

All in all, a fascinating day, which was well organised, and which felt very safe.


