The Mound at Marble Arch

Town and Country Lunch Group

On 14 October a group of us met up for an Otford themed tour followed by lunch. We started off by visiting the newly restored Hospice of Hope coffee shop. We knew from previous visits that we were in for a cake and coffee treat.

We then walked the short distance to the Archbishop's Palace where we were met by our guide and Palace Trustee Nick Rushby. Our talk started in the gate house and was given initially by Rob who is the local historian. Rob gave us a talk about Otford going back to antiquity. He explained that Otford was an observer rather than a participant in the history that has taken place over the centuries. The

Darenth valley, unusually for Kent, runs from south to north therefore placing Otford on the path of travellers and armies heading for London.

Modern developers have tried to acquire part of the palace lands but the council have now granted a 99-year lease on the site and buildings to the Trust, which is working to conserve the Palace, create an interpretation centre for Otford and the Darenth Valley and operate it as a self-sustaining community resource.

Nick gave us a tour of the palace grounds and Tudor buildings finishing with a visit to the tower, which for the moment is locked up and awaiting planned restoration to incorporate a museum and shop. Another useful thing the Trust has done is to provide coloured plaques on buildings, to show what they originally looked like and their original use. Information boards and signposts are also provided strategically around the village to guide visitors. An interesting fact is that the Archbishop's Palace was, at the time, bigger than Hampton Court. A wonderful model showing how the Palace originally looked, is currently to be found in Lullingstone Castle.

Our visit was rounded off by a visit to the Bull pub where we all had a nice lunch.

Examples of mobile phone scams

Text scams offering you money for an accident you may have had is often a ploy to get your personal details. Don't reply, even by sending a 'STOP' text. Simply delete the message.

You may get a text or advert encouraging you to enter a competition for a great prize. The scammers will charge extremely high rates for the messages you send them, as high as £2 per text message. Don't reply.

Trivia scams involve you answering general knowledge questions to win a prize. If you try to claim your prize, you may have to call a premium-rate number, often beginning 0906. You then have to listen to a long recorded message, designed to keep you on the line. It's highly unlikely there'll be a prize at the end of it. Don't phone back to claim.

'SMiShing' (SMS phishing) is when a scammer texts asking for personal or financial information. The message may appear to be from a legitimate company, like a mobile phone provider, but legitimate companies never ask you to provide sensitive information by text. Don't reply to these texts. Simply delete them.

Unless you're using a secure webpage, don't send or receive private information when using public WiFi. And be aware of who's around you when using a mobile device to go online.

The **NHS** will never ask for payment or any financial details.

Bromley Trading Standards is promoting a new telephone number that connects customers directly to their bank to check that calls are genuine. The number **159** is a pilot scheme set up by banks and telephone companies to fight fraud. If you call 159 you will be presented with a series of options. You can then use your keypad to get through to your own bank without having to look up the number or wait for ages to get through.

A TSB scam If you receive the following message claiming to come from TSB- please ignore it.

We need to let you know about some changes to our internet banking service, to meet new banking regulations and make everyday banking more secure. We recently updated our system to use an extra layer of security call Strong Customer Authentication(SCA) to confirm your identity when you log into internet banking. This relies on us having a valid number to send you a One Time Password(OTP) which you will need to log in. Please log in below and update your account on our new SSL standard internet banking security server.

ADVANCE INFORMATION ON A POTENTIAL SHARED LEARNING PROJECT IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE BRUNEL MUSEUM

Brunels' Tunnel. which connected Rotherhithe and Wapping, was constructed between 1825 and 1843. It was the first ever tunnel dug under a river and is still in use today as the route for TFLs Overground Railway. The Brunel Museum sits at the top of the Rotherhithe Shaft and is seeking funds for refurbishment and a new exhibition. You can find out more about the museum on their website https://www.thebrunelmuseum.com However the Brunels did not dig the tunnel themselves; they had a large workforce probably around 36 men on each shift and two shifts a day plus lots of other labourers doing a variety of support tasks. The museum has good records of the tunnelers who perished whilst working on the tunnel but very limited records of the rest of the workforce.

This is where our SLP may be able to help. Our project is likely to research the workforce; what were their names? where did they live? what about their families - did they move with them or stay at home? Indeed where were their homes, were they recruited from the tin mines of Cornwall or the coal mines of Somerset? As you can imagine this will be a challenging task and we are currently looking for U3A members who would be interested in hearing more about the project and who might be interested in becoming a member of the team. We are still at the planning stages but in all probability we are aiming for the beginning of 2022 as a start date. We guess that this will be a popular SLP and demand for places might be high.

Science and Technology

Following our August/September re-start of ordinary meetings, we held similar gatherings at our usual venue of St Paul's Church (Victor Childs room) Orpington in both October and November. The attendances have been good, and seem to be back to what they were prior to the start of the COVID Pandemic.

In October, Viki Worthington gave a talk on the possible link of gut microbiome having an impact on neurological diseases, which at first sight seemed somewhat illogical to the audience but at the end we felt that it could not be discounted. Following this we had a few brief scientific and technological items spotted in the media, and a general discussion on Viki's suggestion that we introduce a sort of Brains Trust at future meetings. The plan was accepted, and probably starting in December, we will have volunteers answering questions posed by other members as of general interest.

The November meeting began with an hour long French documentary film on what is known as 'The Blob' – it being a unicellular organism that despite having no brain or a mouth can learn as well as detect and digest food. Scientifically known as **Physarum polycephalum** it is a type of slime mould with the film being based on research undertaken at the Paris Zoological Park.

After the tea break Anthony Bradburne gave a colourful talk about iridescence and the science behind nature's brilliant hues. We then further discussed the Brains Trust format and updated the list of potential questions, with the idea to encourage everyone to get more involved without having to undertake the usual hour long presentation. Finally we completed what turned out to be a slightly longer meeting than usual with some selected media sourced items of interest.

Thanks also to "Bookworms" members who helped at the event and to Charmaine who volunteered to take the remainder to a charity shop. See you next time.




