London Explorers; Tour of the Charterhouse

Twenty of us enjoyed a very interesting tour of the Charterhouse. After catching two trains to Farringdon and a short walk, we were greeted by a guide at the gate and were shown to the education room. Here we were introduced to a specialist guide who gave us an insight into how the Charterhouse evolved from being originally London's largest cemetery for victims of the Black Death in 1348. The Charterhouse became an important Monastery, a Tudor Manor, a school for boys from poor families and finally an almshouse offering shelter and care for the elderly community, which it remains today.

We learnt a very important fact regarding Association Football; the throw in was adopted in the school's quadrangle; as there was not enough room to kick the ball if it had gone out of play, it had to be thrown in overhead, and is still the rule today.

We had time to look at the museum and the lovely chapel and were then served coffee and were able to ask questions. I think we all agreed it was a very interesting trip.

Philosophy

Iris Murdoch (1919-1999) is regarded by many as one of the greatest philosophers - and novelists- of the twentieth century.

In The Sovereignty of Good - three essays published in 1970 - Murdoch sets out her ideas, many of which are also embedded in her novels. *The Bell* (1958) was her first great success.

Working in Oxford in the 1960s, Murdoch was swimming against the prevailing philosophical tide of existentialism and relativism, of which Jean-Paul Sartre was the main exponent.

She met him once, but was soon to move right away from his nihilism. Her main themes can be illustrated with some quotes from *The Sovereignty of Good*.

On art - 'Great art teaches us how real things can be looked at and loved without being seized and used, without being appropriated into the greedy organism of the self.

On freedom - 'Freedom...is the disciplined overcoming of the self. Humility is not a particular habit of self-effacement, but.....a selfless respect for reality and one of the most difficult and central of all virtues.

On love and the moral life - 'Love is the general name of the quality of attachment and it is capable of infinite degradation; but when it is even partially refined it is the energy and the passion of the soul in its search for Good, the force that joins us to the world through Good. Its existence is the unmistakable sign that we are spiritual creatures, attracted by excellence and made for the Good. It is a reflection of the warmth and light of

While disavowing a personal God, Murdoch's Anglican Christian conditioning remained formative throughout her life. Formative once more in the 21st century, she is seen as a standard bearer for such zeitgeist tropes and memes as mindfulness, attention, lovespeak, compassion, and liberation from the 'fat selfish ego and its self-serving fantasies.' A Platonist who affirmed the 'Good' rather than 'God' she was, fundamentally, an honest broker in the notion of love to the extent that she relentlessly sought its authenticity. And for religious believers she continues to have something to say to those whose belief system has at its centre and heart that most multifaceted and 'thick' of concepts: love.

VISIT TO THE FREUD MUSEUM

On Thursday 31 March, 16 U3A members visited Sigmund Freud's house in Finchley, North London.

We were given an introductory talk by the curator who explained that the house had been bought by Freud in 1938 as a sanctuary from the Nazis who had invaded Austria. Being a Jew (although an atheist), he had to leave Vienna with his wife, daughter and housekeeper. All their possessions were transferred from their home in Vienna to London. He only lived in Finchley for a year until his death from cancer in 1939. His daughter Anna Freud took over the house and lived there for 40 years before leaving it as a museum.

We walked freely around the house which exhibited Freud's study, set up exactly as laid out in Vienna, the central exhibit was his famous couch where he carried out his psychoanalysis on patients. His extensive library and huge archaeological collection were on show. The house was noticeably very light and spacious with a well-kept garden. Anna Freud's office and therapy room

was also exhibited.

Freud, a neurologist, was the founder of psychoanalysis, a clinical method of evaluating and treating pathology in the psyche between patient and psychoanalysis. His ideas have impacted on everyone's daily life and all forms of therapy. He was one of the great influencers on the 19th and 20th centuries revolutionising how we think about the individual psyche.

His daughter Anna was also a very successful psychoanalyst and a pioneer in Child Psychology.

A big thank you to Judy for organising such a wonderful trip and shepherding everyone so efficiently, so that we arrived safely.

Trading Standards Alert!

Bromley Trading Standards are highlighting tactics used by scammers who phone to tell you that your computer has been infected with a virus. They may use the names of well-known firms to appear official and say they can help to solve the problem.

Software firms do NOT make unsolicited calls to help fix computer problems.

Trick you into installing software - this could 'collect' personal details including usernames and passwords e.g. for banking and email

Persuade you to visit websites to download legitimate software that allows the scammers access and control of your computer from any location

Request credit card information and charge you for their services

Guide you to fraudulent websites where you are asked to enter personal and financial information including credit/debit card details

Charge you for software to remove viruses which could be obtained free of charge from legitimate companies

If you cannot come to a particular session, you can return the previous month's book yourself to the library customer services counter - and collect the next book - any time during opening hours.



Science and Technology

Following a tea break, John presented his selection of newsworthy items of Science News.

May saw a guest speaker, David Rea, giving an absorbing and fascinating lecture on Bees and Bee Keeping based mainly on the British Honey Bee. Frankly, I never knew that this could be so interesting and the overall impact was such that we didn't have any time left for John to give his Science News update.
