We happily share our seeds, cuttings and plants and, most importantly, our knowledge with each other.

Four members of our group have taken on the task, from Jean and Roger, of doing the garden at Orpington Hospital and they spent the Covid lockdown doing a wonderful job of planting, weeding and generally keeping the garden in pristine condition. The garden, which is next to the tearoom in the main entrance, is quite beautiful and a real testimony to the enthusiasm and efforts of our u3a volunteers. The hospital staff use the garden to relax and, hopefully, it will be open to all the visitors to the tearoom shortly. Without our ladies' efforts, the garden would have gone back to nature and we owe them a massive vote of thanks.

Jean and Roger open their garden for the National Open Gardens Scheme www.ngs.org.uk each year, sometimes twice. Again, we had massive help from our garden club members. As well as donating many lovely plants and cakes etc, we had lots of help with serving refreshments, selling plants and admitting guests. This year, the total raised at our June opening was just over £2,300 (£1,735.90 to ngs charities and £539.55 to St Christopher's Hospice).

Some of our members are also involved in other local activities benefiting the local environment and residents. It may sound like we are a group being run to support local charities but this is incidental to our main objectives. We are a proactive group all maintaining our own gardens and sharing our knowledge and experience to the benefit of our own members. Our meetings are held monthly at each other's gardens and roughly involve each member "hosting" a meeting once a year. 

Gardening Made Easy





The two Gardening Made Easy Groups held a joint Jubilee 'picnic' meeting. It was held by Rosemary, the leader of the second group. It was most enjoyable especially as the weather was very uncertain that day.

Philosophy

In June we focused on ethics (moral philosophy) relating to genetic engineering, discussing the research interests of Jeantine Lunshof, a contemporary philosopher and ethicist.

By sequencing the human genome, scientists are now able to determine the entire genetic makeup of an individual. This will provide greater understanding of disease, more accurate diagnosis and the likelihood of developing more effective therapies.

Scientists can also manipulate genes in humans (and other organisms). This is known as gene editing and has many applications such as: gene therapy (to treat genetic disease); genetic modification in agriculture (to improve crop yield) and in gene drives (to control invasive species).

The aims of these innovations are to benefit humankind but, as highlighted by scientific ethicists, there are moral and negative sides to consider too. A particular concern of Jeantine Lunshof is the environmental threat posed by gene drives, explained in a video watched and discussed at the meeting:

Is it right or is it wrong to edit genes to prevent human disease and suffering? In every case there are a number of considerations but no easy answers.

Use another phone if possible to ring your bank on 159 to check your account is secure.

We are also being warned about Roofing scams - DON'T DEAL WITH DOORSTEP **CALLERS!**

The risks in doing so are - shoddy work, a fraction of what was quoted being done, having no recourse, substantial overcharge and rogues coming back for more. Don't be influenced by flashy leaflets or smooth talking.

After our last Monday morning session, prior to Easter, we went out for a pub lunch. This made a pleasant change as we'd been unable to meet socially for such a long time.


