# 16 Oct - London Seen Through Painters' Eyes - Graham Taylor

The talk is fully illustrated and is presented by David, a volunteer guide at the London Transport Museum and the deviser of an award winning tour of the architecture on some classic Underground stations.

# **Philosophy**

At the August meeting of the Philosophy group, I gave a talk based on the cult favourite autobiographical work by Robert M Pirsig, Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance. I freely admit I know next to nothing of philosophy, and I joined the group to learn more.

While we often think of philosophy as primarily in the domain of the humanities and social sciences, Robert M Pirsig is recognized for his contributions to science and technology. However, his most famous work addressed distinctly 20th-century questions related to what defines good and what defines bad - in other words, the metaphysics of quality.

In its introduction, Pirsig explains that, despite its title, "it should in no way be associated with that great body of factual information relating to orthodox Zen Buddhist practice. It's not very factual on motorcycles, either." John

Glynis gave us a very detailed and interesting talk on Voltaire in September. She has summarised it as follows:-

Voltaire (1694-1778) was a larger-than-life character, a man-of-letters, who wrote in many genres, from verse to serious prose, on politics to science. He was an architect of the Enlightenment. Witty and brave, he was hated by some but adored by others. He wanted to make people think.

# **London Explorers**

# Visit to The Kings Troop Royal Artillery at their Woolwich barracks

The Royal Horse Artillery was founded in 1793. It fought in the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic wars, through to WW1. It gave mobile fire support to the fast moving cavalry, which was then mechanised, and in 1946 the regiment became known as The Riding Troop later renamed The King's Troop, after inspection by King George VI. It is now the only remaining mounted unit of the Royal Artillery.

Highlight of the visit was the horses. These are similar size to a Shire, although not as heavily built. Each horse is placed in position in the team pulling the gun carriage according to its build and ability. They have beautiful stables, clean and airy. When they are ready for retirement they can be bought by anyone who has worked with them. The saddlery was very interesting, with the smell of polish and leather, harnesses and saddles, all hand made and stitched to the highest standards.

Two horses were getting attention in the Farriers. Again very clean and airy. Furnaces were alight but cool as big doors open at the end and plenty of windows. Our last visit was where the gun carriages are cleaned, and polished.

There are various large areas where the horses are trained including a very large grassy area where they practise their moves for occasions, such as Queen Elizabeth's funeral and King Charles' coronation. They do demonstrations around the country, especially the Musical Drive, where the horses pull gun carriages in time to music.

We were made very welcome, and all enjoyed the visit. Geoff





# **Theatre Matinee**

#### Visit to The Hever Festival Theatre

On a drizzly Friday in August, we set-off by coach from Orpington. The drizzle was of some concern as the Theatrical performance we were to see at Hever was being held on an open-air stage with limited cover.

Fortunately, by the time we arrived at Hever, the sky had cleared and we enjoyed a sunny afternoon. The stage was set on a lawn surrounded by beautiful gardens and trees.

The play we went to see was A Chorus of Disapproval presented by the Bromley Little Theatre and written by the award winning playwright and theatre director Sir Alan Avckbourn.

The play takes place at PALOS (Pendon Amateur Light Operatic Society) and tells the story of widower Guy Jones and his rise through the amateur operatic company due to his inability to say "no" and the expectations placed on him. The play is juxtaposed with scenes and music from The Beggar's Opera.

The play has been praised by Michael Billington of the Guardian as a "brilliantly intricate comedy which skilfully interweaves two themes, the destructiveness of innocence and the spread of civic corruption".

After the play we enjoyed a very good afternoon tea in the Pavilion after which we returned to Orpington. Hazel and I would like express our gratitude to Pauline and Gordon for organising this most enjoyable afternoon and for the way they looked after us all. Carlos and Hazel

But in the case of Yvonne Fletcher, a close colleague of hers is still fighting for justice and does not want the story to be forgotten, hence the book. And the book about Kim Wall was written because her parents actively want the world to know about their beloved daughter.

# Trading ALERT! Standards



**Bromley Trading Standards** is reminding residents to be very wary of gardeners, tree 'surgeons', or other traders offering their services through a leaflet or a cold call at your door.

Whatever the work being offered, dealing with

doorstep traders risks shoddiness, having no recourse, and being substantially overcharged

# Do NOT:

- **Don't** contact trader via leaflets without thorough checks <u>beforehand</u>
- **Don't** deal at the door it's **OK** to say NO
- **Don't** pay large sums of money in advance
- **Don't** assume rubbish collection is included
- **Don't** accept that traders are members of an organisation because they use a <u>logo</u>
- **Don't** be rushed into a decision seek advice first from someone you trust

#### Do:

- Do get several quotes prepare a clear list of works <u>beforehand</u>
- Do seek references; read reliable reviews; ask to visit previous jobs before work <u>starts</u>
- Do check directly with any /website reputable organisation named or whose logo is shown on a leaflet to confirm the trader is affiliated with them
- Do get a contract in writing before the work starts - check the T&Cs
- **Do** check and verify a trader's insurance
